

# Message from the Principal

#### Dear Parent/Carer

The first term of the academic year has passed very quickly and on reflection it is probably because of the amount of work and activities that have occurred since the very beginning of September. The summer seems to be a distant memory however the work and refurbishment that took place over the holiday is very much being enjoyed by pupils and staff. The refurbishment of blue wing, the addition of a new computer suite, along with a new SMART board in each classroom across the school, has certainly enhanced the learning environment. The outside social space has also been a benefit for the increasing number of pupils attending Abbey Park.

The busy open evenings and mornings saw in the region of over 1400 people visiting the school. It is good to be able to welcome visitors and hold face to face meetings so the community can experience our excellent facilities and see what Abbey Park has to offer. During the evenings we were able to share our initial information on GCSE results for 2021-2. Of our previous Yr11 cohort, 70% achieved a grade 4 in English and Maths and 48% grade 5 in English and Maths. These were extremely pleasing results for the cohort and we are already hearing of pupils successes in further education and training.

#### **Uniform and Attendance**

As you may be aware we have carried out a significant drive on uniform standards and attendance, which again has been very successful and we thank you for your support in this. # **English**

# **Power of Reading Assembly**

Mr Snook has been delivering special reading assemblies all this week on the power of reading. During these assemblies he has also been revealing pupils who logged their reading books for pleasure over the summer as part of the Summer Reading Challenge. 156 book entries were logged across all year groups with some pupils logging more that 5 reading books - a fantastic achievement. All pupils that took part will receive and R2 and pupils who logged more that 5 will be receiving R4s.

## **Accelerated Reader to launch**

Accelerated Reader will be launching after half term. <u>Accelerated Reader</u> is a computer program that helps teachers and librarians manage and monitor children's independent reading practice. Your child picks a book at their own level and reads it at their own pace. When finished, your child takes a short quiz on the computer. (Passing the quiz is an indication that your child understood what was read.) Accelerated Reader gives children, teachers, and librarians feedback based on the quiz results, which the teacher then uses to help your child set goals and direct ongoing reading practice.

Children using Accelerated Reader choose their own books to read, rather than having one assigned to them. This makes reading a much more enjoyable experience as they can choose books that are interesting to them.

Black History Month 2022

During this term, Mr Young delivered an assembly to all year groups to commence Black History Month. We are very pleased to hear the conversations pupils have been having on hearing the examples of positive Black groups throughout the years within military services.

The month of October marks Black History Month in the UK. The event has been celebrated in the UK since 1987. As stated by the BBC "People from African and Caribbean backgrounds have been a fundamental part of British history for centuries. However, campaigners believe their value and contribution to society is often overlooked, ignored or distorted." #### PRESS RELEASE: Students at Abbey Park School awarded a coveted Eco-Schools Green Flag.

Pupils at Abbey Park School have earned an international accreditation this academic year, recognising their amazing work in making their school more environmentally friendly and raising eco-awareness in fellow pupils.

Eco-Schools is an international education programme that prompts young people to explore sustainability and climate change and act.

Students at Abbey Park School collaborated with Mrs Coles to conduct a thorough environmental review, assessing how eco-friendly their school is and what eco behaviours are displayed by students and staff. They reviewed everything from the school's recycling practices, to energy usage, to how environmental themes are covered in classrooms. Building on their findings, the pupils and Mrs Coles planned a year of activities that would up their green-credentials.

The group connected their work to 3 Eco-Schools topics: transport, natural habitats and eco schools recruitment and promotion.

Activities included a walk to school week, creating and maintaining natural habitats in and outside school and holding formal ecomeetings to discuss future projects. They were also able to ask the MP for North Swindon, Justin Tomlinson about his views.

solo part of defying gravity.




# Safeguarding information

Welcome to our first 'Safeguarding newsletter' of the school year. At Abbey Park we are committed to ensuring a culture of safe-guarding in our school and it is paramount in all we do. We hope that our termly safeguarding update will give you an overview of our approach, offer some useful guidance and information and inform you of what your child is learning in school about how to keep themselves safe. ### What does Safeguarding look like at Abbey Park?

At Abbey Park School we follow the Government policy document 'Keeping Children Safe in Education'. This is statutory guidance for all schools in England to follow and comply with. It has recently been updated and therefore our safeguarding policy has been updated to reflect this. You can find this on our safeguarding section on the school website. Safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children is **everyone's responsibility.** Everyone who comes into contact with children and their families has a role to play in making sure that children grow up having the best life chances. In order to fulfil this responsibility effectively, all adults should make sure their approach puts the child at the centre of the decision making and that the best interests of the child are always considered. We believe that it is in the best interest of our children to have opportunities to learn how to stay safe both in and outside of school. Our safeguarding themes are woven into lessons across the curriculum, into assemblies and throughout daily life in school. Here are just a few examples of how we teach safeguarding at Abbey Park:

- Dedicated safeguarding team in school every day
- Pastoral support for each group.
- Emotional Literacy Support Assistants (ELSA's) and Pastoral Support Assistants who have specialist training in supporting a child in their social and emotional needs
- Members of staff who have completed basic mental health training
- Mental health pupil ambassadors
- Mental health staff ambassadors
- A dedicated mental health lead Mrs Stevens
- Wellbeing Wednesday each Wednesday Tutor time looking at how to look after mental health
- Assemblies and lessons taught throughout the year, including but not extensively, anti-bullying, equality, diversity, fire, sun, children's safety, exploitation, sexual harassment and violence and online safety.
- PHSE curriculum covering how to be healthy, having healthy relationships and developing emotional literacy
- Online safety curriculum
- RSE (Relationships and sex education) curriculum
- Weekly tutor time reminders about staying safe in school and our expectations
