Dear Parent/Carer

For the first time in a while we have started to feel a sense of normality at Abbey Park and I think you will find this term's newsletter reflects this.

We are very pleased that the TPAT scholars programme in co-ordination with LPA has developed over the term. The Scholar cohorts are working on various projects and some excellent essays have been received. Recently the Yr7 group visited LPA for a careers afternoon where they listened to a presentation on the possibilities of university – it is never too early to aspire to this and to explore opportunities. We hope to see more of these events over the remainder of the year.

As you are aware, reading is very important for a child's development and when supported by parents helps children to make further progress in their studies. We would like to thank you for your support of the 2021 Swindon Christmas Toy Appeal.

It was amazing to see so many schools, churches, businesses, and individuals, from across Swindon and surrounding areas, get involved again to make the fifth consecutive Toy Appeal happen. Whether you donated toys, gave financially, or volunteered, we are so thankful for your contribution which made it all possible.

We received donations of 2,382 new toys (not including thousands of stocking fillers!), 679 books and 205 soft toys. In addition, through financial donations, we received a further £8,000 to put towards the purchase of toys and gift vouchers for any age categories with fewer donations. This enabled us to help a total of 923 children, 200 more than the previous year. Thanks to your generosity, each child was given a complete gift sack, including 3 main presents, a book, soft toy (ages 0-5) and 2 stocking fillers. These were then delivered by volunteers to the 373 referred families, ready in time for Christmas.

After another difficult year, it was a privilege to be able to work together to bring a little hope and happiness to local families living in desperate need. We were truly overwhelmed by the response so thank you again.






# **English**

This creative piece was made by gluing crayons to a canvas with a glue gun and them melting them with a hairdryer. Stella, the person in the middle holding an umbrella, was created by printing her off and gluing her on to the canvas. To stop her being covered up by the melted crayons I used masking tape to protect her. She is missing a leg as in the event if pulling the tape of unfortunately her leg came off as well.

This design represents Stella and her emotions. The dark colours are associated with her negative emotions and the light colours are associated with her positive emotions. An emotion associated with the darker colours (making it a negative thought) is the loss of her mother. An emotion associated with the lighter colours (making it a positive thought) is that she has somewhere to stay. I have tried to emphasise the fact that she tries to block out the bad thoughts. I have done this by using an umbrella to shield herself. I have also tried to show that she has more negative thoughts than positive thoughts by simply having the majority of colours dark and only a fraction of them light.



### **Maths**

#### **Maths Past Paper Club**

The Maths Past Paper Club runs after school on Thursdays 3.20pm - 4.30pm. It started at the beginning of term 3 and has attracted over one hundred year 11 students eager to improve their grades. Papers are made available on a Thursday (available from Past Paper Club, Show My Homework or from Mrs Lloyd in RF12), completed at home and then discussed in depth at Past Paper Club the following Thursday. The sessions are invaluable as the mark scheme is examined so that students understand how marks are allocated and the class teacher can demonstrate solutions and address specific student questions.

Multiple classes targeting either the Foundation or the Higher Paper are run and although no sign up is required, experience suggests regular weekly attendance yields the best results with around 85% of regular attendees achieving or exceeding their target grade.
