

Geography

National Fieldwork Festival 2024

The Geographical Association encourages schools to take part in the National Festival of Fieldwork which as a school we have taken part in throughout the month of June across all year groups within Humanities.

Fieldwork is an essential part of a geographical education as well as being within the National Curriculum as a requirement at GCSE and for future studies at A level. It enables young people to develop their subject knowledge, gain a range of skills that are difficult to develop in the classroom and helps them to understand geographical reality.

In order to achieve this, we conducted a study around the school site, assessing how sustainable APS is. We have conducted this study in previous years which has been highly beneficial to the school because last years main findings were the lack of recycle bins in our outdoor spaces and this been addressed.

This year, the main findings have been the ratio of benches to pupils. This is something that we have put forward to Mr Young and he can now start discussions with the site team to see what can be done to improve our site further.

Thank you to all pupils. They have been thoughtful towards how we can make Abbey Park School more sustainable for our school community.

Trips

Art & Photography trip to Wake the Tiger, Bristol: Thursday 6th June

We took 120 students to Wake the Tiger in Bristol. This is a fantastic immersive art exhibition that really must be seen to be believed!

It is a transformative and empowering space that uses art as an invitation to connect and inspire positive change.

Pupils will use the photographs they took to make work for their GCSE projects.

We all had an amazing time and felt it was a brilliant experience that we would recommend to families.













Year 10 Geographers completed their first piece of fieldwork for their GCSE. Pupils collected primary data (the width, depth and velocity) on both a straight and meander section of the River Cole, so that they could compare the characteristics at different locations and be able to answer their enquiry question.

They also collected secondary data and had a talk from someone who worked at the National Trust site to gain an understanding of how the river has been managed over time and what different strategies have been put in place to try and restore the river to its natural state.

After conducting their data collection, pupils came back to school and completed their write-up, where they drew graphs and analysed what they showed. They finally evaluated their fieldwork and decided how they could improve it if they were to go again.

Pupils were really engaged throughout the trip, all got involved and became true Geographers for the day.

Year 9 Residential to Battlefields: Thursday 20th - Saturday 22nd June

Recently, Year 9 pupils embarked on a remarkable school trip to visit the First World War Battlefields. The trip was filled

with poignant moments, enlightening discoveries, and delightful indulgences that left a lasting impact on all who participated.

Pupils had the opportunity to explore the Bayernwald Trench System, a historical site that gave our pupils a vivid perspective on the realities of war. As they navigated through the intricate network of trenches, bunkers and tunnels, they gained a deeper understanding of the sacrifices made by soldiers who fought bravely during World War I. It was a humbling experience that brought history to life and sparked meaningful conversations.

Following their visit to the Bayernwald Trench System, they had the privilege of paying their respects at the Menin Gate, a monument dedicated to the memory of those missing. During the Last Post ceremony, two of our pupils had the honour of laying a wreath as a gesture of remembrance and gratitude. It was a moving tribute that resonated with everyone present, reminding us of the importance of honouring those who have sacrificed for our freedom.

Day two saw our visit to the 'Sunken Lane', a haunting reminder of the brutal trench warfare that defined the conflict. As we walked along the sunken paths the gravity of war enveloped us, stirring sombre reflections on the hardships endured by soldiers on both sides. We paid our respects at the Newfoundland Memorial Park, a solemn tribute to the soldiers of the Newfoundland Regiment who bravely fought and perished in the Battle of the Somme.

Our journey continued to the awe-inspiring Lochnagar Crater, a massive scar on the French landscape created by a detonation during the first day of the Battle of the Somme. The sheer magnitude of the crater left us without words, evoking a sense of awe and reverence for the destructive power of war and the resilience of the human spirit in its aftermath.

Finally, we arrived at the Thiepval Memorial, a monumental tribute to the missing British and South African soldiers who fell during the Battle of the Somme and have no known grave. Here, amidst the towering arches and inscribed names of the fallen, we bowed our heads in silent tribute, honouring the memory of those who gave their lives in service of their countries.

As our journey through the battlefields drew to a close, our hearts were heavy with the weight of history and the sacrifices of those who came before us. We concluded with a visit to Langemarck German Cemetery and a solemn stop at the Passchendaele Cemetery and the Passchendaele Memorial Museum.









We are grateful for the opportunity to embark on this journey together, and we look forward to future adventures that will broaden our horizons and deepen our appreciation for the diverse experiences that shape our world.

Year 7 trip to Bletchley Park: Wednesday 26th June

45 Year 7 pupils and staff headed on a discovery into the secrets of Bletchley Park in Buckinghamshire on Wednesday 26th June. As soon as they arrived, they were split into two groups and given the following mission to fulfil as they explored the large area that encloses many huts as well as the main house that housed the hundreds of codebreakers Britain had working on deciphering enemy messages throughout the second world war.

YOUR MISSION

Your creativity and problem-solving ingenuity will be of great use. You will need to apply these skills and work alongside others who are doing the same. Please remember that you cannot share your codebreaking work with anyone, apart from your fellow Codebreakers with whom you are training today.

It is absolutely crucial that you remember that careless talk costs lives!

They explored Hut 8 where Alan Turing worked on decrypting the German naval coding machine, called Enigma. Pupils were able to use the Enigma machine during their codes and ciphers workshop where they practiced deciphered secret codes.



They also saw the famous Bombe machine that helped speed up the process of decrypting Enigma and paved the way for the first computer to be built by other codebreakers at Bletchley Park.







We were also lucky to have a tour of Bletchley Park from very interesting guides who were able to provide the background history of the place and some personal stories about people who worked there.

It was a hot day, but we came prepared and everyone had a marvellous time having learned lots about codes and decryption.

- Discount book shops such as The Works offer a wide range of books at discount prices.
- Online WoB (World of Books) is a secondhand book shop which offers books at a reasonable price and offers free delivery in the UK.

At Abbey Park we are committed to ensuring a culture of safeguarding in our school and it is paramount in all we do. We hope that our termly safeguarding update will give you an overview of our approach, offer some useful guidance and information and inform you of what your child is learning in school about how to keep themselves safe. What does Safeguarding look like at Abbey Park?

At Abbey Park School we follow the Government policy document 'Keeping Children Safe in Education'. This is statutory guidance for all schools in England to follow and comply with. It has recently been updated and therefore our safeguarding policy has been updated to reflect this. You can find this on our safeguarding section on the school website. Safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children is **everyone's responsibility.** Everyone who comes into contact with children and their families has a role to play in making sure that children grow up having the best life chances. In order to fulfil this responsibility effectively, all adults should make sure their approach puts the child at the centre of the decision making and that the best interests of the child are always considered. We believe that it is in the best interest of our children to have opportunities to learn how to stay safe both in and outside of school. Our safeguarding themes are woven into lessons across the curriculum, into assemblies and throughout daily life in school. Here are just a few examples of how we teach safeguarding at Abbey Park:

Dedicated safeguarding team in school every day


