

Message from the Principal

Dear Parents/Carers,

I begin by saying a huge thank you to the Performing Arts team for the production of the Little Shop of Horrors. What a magnificent way to end the term with such a polished performance of what is a challenging show to put on. The performers were so well-rehearsed in their movement, lines and singing, that the audience were enthralled. The comments from parents and supporters such as 'this could go on the Wyvern Stage', 'We've travelled from London, but it was well worth it' and 'this is the best school production I have ever seen', echoed around the Hall afterwards. Parents expressed their gratitude for providing the opportunity for their child to participate, which is testament to the work of the Performing Arts team. Be under no illusion, the 6 months in the making has been hard work but well worth it. All those involved are certainly Abbey Park Proud.

During the term there have been a number of subject consultation evenings and I would like to thank parents for their support in attending. Finding out about your child's academic performance is important and helps parents to support at home. As a school we are aware that some parents would like further curriculum information, so we are currently looking at how we improve this communication.

As I mentioned last term, it has been good for pupils to widen their experience from visitors and different trips. There have been quite a number of theatre trips – just recently the Yr10 Science trip to the New Theatre Oxford, provided the opportunity to listen to some emanant scientists one of which was Professor Robert Winston. The Yr11 Geography fieldwork was a great success. The pupils' conduct was excellent, as they explored Bristol Harbour to collect a range of data, which will relate to their final GCSE exam. Another valuable experience was that of the performance from a drama team called 'Alter Ego'. This allowed pupils across the school to gain awareness of the dangers in involvement in County Lines and Criminal Exploitation.

There have been some great sporting successes. Congratulations to Anubis M for his selection to represent Wiltshire in Cross Country at the South West Championships. This is a brilliant achievement, reflecting the commitment that he has to training and preparation for such events. Well done to the participants in the cross country who have achieved so much. Football results have been good also with both our Yr11 and Yr7 teams reaching the semi-final of their cup competitions.

It is good to celebrate pupils' success and achievements both in the classroom and out in sport and performances. As a school we are developing our opportunities to develop character and culture in our pupils. Mr Maddern, Assistant Principal has been exploring ways in which to do this and we look forward to the introduction of E-Praise next term, which is a logging system which will be rolled out to pupils and eventually parents.

Meeting many parents this term, at events and parent's evenings, has been a pleasure. Your support is so important to us and has enabled the school to develop continuously. Thank you for working in partnership with us.



PSHE and RSE

On Wednesday 25th January all pupils were invited to watch a live production of 'County Lines' by the theatre company AlterEgo. This was a powerful production highlighting the very serious and emotional issue of Child Criminal Exploitation.

The play, which has been seen by hundreds of professionals and thousands of young people throughout the UK, has proved highly effective in raising awareness around:-

- · What is County Lines and how can it affect young people.
- · The Grooming Process and how it can apply to CountyLines.
- · The similarities and potential crossovers between Child Criminal Exploitation (CCE) and Child Sexual Exploitation (CSE).
- · Where to go for help & advice.

As part of our whole school PSHCE programme we felt this was an engaging and innovative way of raising awareness of the issues relating to Child Criminal Exploitation and giving young people the skills and knowledge to be able to protect themselves from this form of abuse.

Our pupils were an exceptional audience and enjoyed the production. Below are some comments from pupils about the show.

Safeguarding information

At Abbey Park we are committed to ensuring a culture of safeguarding in our school and it is paramount in all we do. We hope that our termly safeguarding update will give you an overview of our approach, offer some useful guidance and information and inform you of what your child is learning in school about how to keep themselves safe. For more information about safeguarding, please look at our website.

What does Safeguarding look like at Abbey Park?

At Abbey Park School we follow the Government policy document 'Keeping Children Safe in Education'. This is statutory guidance for all schools in England to follow and comply with. It has recently been updated and therefore our safeguarding policy has been updated to reflect this. You can find this on our safeguarding section on the school website. Safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children is **everyone's responsibility**. Everyone who comes into contact with children and their families has a role to play in making sure that children grow up having the best life chances. In order to fulfil this responsibility effectively, all adults should make sure their approach puts the child at the centre of the decision making and that the best interests of the child are always considered. We believe that it is in the best interest of our children to have opportunities to learn how to stay safe both in and outside of school. Our safeguarding themes are woven into lessons across the curriculum, into assemblies and throughout daily life in school. Here are just a few examples of how we teach safeguarding at Abbey Park:

- Dedicated safeguarding team in school every day
- Pastoral support for each group.
- Emotional Literacy Support Assistants (ELSA's) and Pastoral Support Assistants who have specialist training in supporting a child in their social and emotional needs
- Members of staff who have completed basic mental health training
- Mental health pupil ambassadors
- Mental health staff ambassadors
- A dedicated mental health lead Mrs Stevens
- Wellbeing Wednesday each Wednesday Tutor time looking at how to look after mental health
- Assemblies and lessons taught throughout the year, including but not extensively, anti-bullying, equality, diversity, fire, sun, children's safety, exploitation, sexual harassment and violence and online safety.
- PHSE curriculum covering how to be healthy, having healthy relationships and developing emotional literacy
- Online safety curriculum
- RSE (Relationships and sex education) curriculum
- Weekly tutor time reminders about staying safe in school and our expectations

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

Snapchot is a photo- and video-sharing app which also allows users to chot with friends via text or audio Users can share images and videos with specific friends, or through a 'story' (documenting the previous 24 hours) visible to their entire friend list. Snapchat usage rose during the pandemic, with many young people utilising it to connect with their peers. The app continues to develop features to engage an even larger audience and emulate current trends, rivalling platforms such as TikTok and Instagram



CONNECTING WITH STRANGERS

Even if your child only connects on the app with people they know, they may still receive friend requests from strongers. Snopchat's links with appa such as Wink and Hoop have increased this possibility. Accepting a request means that children are then disclosing personal information through the story. SnapMap and spotlight features. This could allow predators to gain their trust for sinister purposes.

EXCESSIVE USE

There are many features that are attractive to users and keep them excited about the app. Snap streaks encourage app. smap stream encourage users to send snaps daily, spotlight Challenges give users to the chance to obtain maney and online fame, and the Spotlight feature's scrall of videos makes it easy for children to spend hours watching content.

INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

Some videos and posts on Snapchat are not suitable for children. The hashtags used to group content are determined by the poster, so an innocent search term could still yield age—inappropriate results. The app's Discover function jets users swipe through snippets of news stories and trending articles that often

Sexting continues to be a risk associated with Snapchat. The app's 'disappearing messages' feature makes it easy for young people (teens in particular) to thore explicit images on impulse. While these pictures do disappear — and the sender is notified if it has been screenshotted first—users have found alternative methods to save images, such as taking pictures with a separate device.

DAMAGE TO CONFIDENCE

Snapchat's filters and lenses are a popular seay for users to enhance their 'sellle game'. Although many are designed to entertain or amuse, the 'beautify' filters on photos can set unrealistic hibers on photos can set unreclistic body image expectations and create feelings of inadequacy. Comparing themselves unlavourably against other Snapchat users could threaten a child's confidence or sense of self-worth.

VISIBLE LOCATION

My Places lets users check in and search for popular spots nearby — such as restourants, parks or shopping centres — and recommend them to their friends. The potential issue with a young person consistently checking into locations on snapchat is that it allows other users in their friends Ist (even people they have only ever met online) to see where they currently are and where they regularly go. My Places lets users check in

and trending articles that often include adult content. There is currently no way to turn off this feature.

Advice for Parents & Carers

#NOFILTER

TURN OFF QUICK ADD

The Quick Add function helps people find each other on the app. This function works based on mutual friends or whether someone's number is in your child's contacts list. Explain to your child that this feature could potentially make their profile visible to strangers. We recommend that your child turns off Quick Add, which can be done in the settings (accessed via the cog ican).

CHAT ABOUT CONTENT

Tak to your child about what is and isn't wise to share on Snapchat (e.g. don't post explicit images or videos, or display identifiable details like their school unitarm). Remind them that once something is online, the creator loses control over where it might end up — and who with. Additionally, Snapchat's 'Spotlight' feature has a #challenge like TixTok's: it's vital that your child understands the potentially harmful consequences of taking part in these challenges.

CHOOSE GOOD CONNECTIONS

Enapchat has recently announced that it is rolling out a new safety feature; users will receive notifications reminding them of the importance of maintaining connections with people they actually know well, as opposed to strangers. This Triend Check Up' encourages users to addete connections with users they rarely communicate with, to maintain their aniline safety and privacy.

KEEP ACCOUNTS PRIVATE

Profiles are private by default, but children may make them public to goin more tollowers. Your child can send Snaps directly to friends, but Steries are visible to everyone they have added, unless they change the settings. If they was SnapMaps, they location is visible unless "Ohdst Mode" is enabled (again via settings). It's prudent to emphosise the importance of not adding people they don't know in real life. This is particularly important with the addition of My Places, which allows other Snapchatters to see the places your child regularly visits and checks in. Additionally, it is important to be cautious about Shared Stories as this allows people who are not an your contact list access to the poet.

TALK ABOUT SEXTING

It may feel like an awkward conversation (and one that young people can be rejuctant to have) but it is important to talk openly and non-judgementally about setting. Discuss the legal implications of sending, receiving or sharing explicit images, as well as the possible emotional impact, imphasize that your child should never leaf pressured into setting - and that if they receive unwanted explicit images, they should tell a trusted adult straight away.

BE READY TO BLOCK AND REPORT

If a stranger does connect with your child on Snapchat and begins to make them feel uncomfortable through bullying, pressure to send explicit images to them, your child can select the three dots on that person's profile and choose report or block. There are options to state why they are reporting that user (annoying or malicious messages, spam, or masqueroding as someone else, for example).
