Dear Parent/Carer,

The start of Year 6 transition to Abbey Park School, a significant event in the calendar, reminds us that the end of the academic year is fast approaching. We seem to fit so much into this last term but it is all worthwhile as it provides some exciting and beneficial experiences for our young people.

I would like to take this opportunity to show my appreciation to our 'Peer Mentors' for their support of Year 6 during their induction. A cohort of 240, new to the building and expectations is a challenge, but the hard work of this team of APS pupils means that the new cohort are well prepared for September. The singing in the final assembly of induction was outstanding! It is also good to report that the cohort is full and that Abbey Park will be at capacity of 1200 pupils in September.

Across the country, recruitment of teachers has been a challenge, but I am pleased to say that as planned, we are able to run our full curriculum for the next academic year. A number of staff are moving on to new posts or abroad - we wish them the very best in their new ventures and thank them for their work here at Abbey Park School. I know they will be missed by pupils and colleagues. Mrs McKeeman retires this year - we appreciate all she had done for MFL teaching at Abbey Park and all the very best for the future. Further on into the newsletter you will find a summary of those staff leaving and new appointments to replace them.

This year has been eventful, in particular the long-awaited Ofsted visit in January was a very positive experience and has since been endorsed through visits from our external consultant and Challenge Partners. The latter is an organisation which we subscribe to, where a team of school leaders visit and carry out a review of aspects of the school such as curriculum and teaching and learning. We know that it is always important to work with these partners to identify our next steps for improvement as we continuously strive to develop.

Recent sporting events such as sports day, have provided the opportunity for pupils to display their ability and commitment, which has been fantastic to watch. We've also had many pupils help out our partner primaries in the Trust with their sports days, where they have shown exemplary conduct and leadership.

Opportunities such as the Battlefields visit to Ypres and surrounding areas, where our pupils laid a wreath from APS at the Menin Gate evening memorial service, again showing the respectful nature of our pupils and staff. Further visits to Bletchley Park, Oxford Natural History Museum/Pitt Rivers Exhibition, The River Cole, as well as Duke of Edinburgh expedition and PGL experience, have shown the many positive and determined qualities of those who participated. I express my gratitude to our staff who have given up their time in school, evenings and weekends.

Finally, congratulations to all pupils who attended our annual awards evening this week. It was a great opportunity to recognise and celebrate academic achievements across the curriculum.

The staff at Abbey Park wish you well for the summer and anticipate another good year working with you and the community in September. Pupils have been reminded of how to stay safe over the summer break and we look forward to their return in September.



- Discount book shops such as The Works offer a wide range of books at discount prices.
- Online WoB (World of Books) is a secondhand book shop which offers books at a reasonable price and offers free delivery in the UK.





At Abbey Park we are committed to ensuring a culture of safeguarding in our school and it is paramount in all we do. We hope that our termly safeguarding update will give you an overview of our approach, offer some useful guidance and information and inform you of what your child is learning in school about how to keep themselves safe. For more information about safeguarding, please look at our website.

What does Safeguarding look like at Abbey Park?

At Abbey Park School we follow the Government policy document 'Keeping Children Safe in Education'. This is statutory guidance for all schools in England to follow and comply with. It has recently been updated and therefore our safeguarding policy has been updated to reflect this. You can find this on our safeguarding section on the school website. Safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children is **everyone's responsibility.** Everyone who comes into contact with children and their families has a role to play in making sure that children grow up having the best life chances. In order to fulfil this responsibility effectively, all adults should make sure their approach puts the child at the centre of the decision making and that the best interests of the child are always considered. We believe that it is in the best interest of our children to have opportunities to learn how to stay safe both in and outside of school. Our safeguarding themes are woven into lessons across the curriculum, into assemblies and throughout daily life in school. Here are just a few examples of how we teach safeguarding at Abbey Park:

- Dedicated safeguarding team in school every day
- Pastoral support for each group.
- Emotional Literacy Support Assistants (ELSA's) and Pastoral Support Assistants who have specialist training in supporting a child in their social and emotional needs
- Members of staff who have completed basic mental health training
- Mental health pupil ambassadors
- Mental health staff ambassadors
- A dedicated mental health lead Mrs Stevens
- Wellbeing Wednesday each Wednesday Tutor time looking at how to look after mental health
- Assemblies and lessons taught throughout the year, including but not extensively, anti-bullying, equality, diversity, fire, sun, children's safety, exploitation, sexual harassment and violence and online safety.
- PHSE curriculum covering how to be healthy, having healthy relationships and developing emotional literacy
- Online safety curriculum
- RSE (Relationships and sex education) curriculum
- Weekly tutor time reminders about staying safe in school and our expectations

If you need any support with your child, please contact a member of the safeguarding Team.

Assembly and PSHE this term:

During term 6 pupils have had assemblies about general safeguarding, what makes a good leader, world refugee day, sports day, perseverance, staying safe over the summer and house assemblies.

During PSHE this term pupils have been learning about the following topics:
